Letter from The Rectory

Where do you 'see in' the New Year? Is it at a party with lots of friends, or at an event in a hotel, pub or club? Perhaps you prefer to celebrate it quietly at home with your family, or maybe circumstances mean that you have to see in the New Year on your own.



At one time many churches had 'Watchnight' Services on New Year's Eve and they encouraged their members to prepare for, or to 'see in', the New Year with an act of worship. For the most part these services seem to have died out and very much doubt if many would want to come to such an event these days. But although we no longer have a special service on New Year's Eve there are still opportunities to celebrate the beginning of a New Year with special acts of worship.

New Year's Day is actually the feast of the **Naming of Jesus** also known as the 'Circumcision'. On this day the Church remembers the occasion when, in obedience to the Law, the infant Jesus received the outward sign of the Covenant in his flesh and was also officially given His name. Our Lord's name has a tremendous significance. It means 'Yahweh saves'. Indeed we know that Jesus is the one who saves! So on New Year's Day why not come along to the Eucharist to honour the name of Jesus

and to dedicate the New Year to His Holy Name, acknowledging Him afresh as Lord and Saviour.

Then on the Sunday after Epiphany (13th January), we celebrate the **Feast of the Baptism of Our Lord**. For

Christ this event marked the beginning of His Ministry and as He entered the waters of Jordan He was able to identify with the sinful humanity that He had come to save. When we celebrate Christ's Baptism we are given a wonderful opportunity to give thanks for our own Baptism, the beginning of our life in Christ. At the 10.30 am service on that day we bless water and are invited to use it to mark ourselves with the sign of the cross on our foreheads so renewing our baptismal covenant with Christ. This lovely ceremony, which is a fairly recent one in Anglican liturgy, had a truly ecumenical inspiration being based partly on the Easter Orthodox custom of blessing the waters at Epiphany and the Methodist Covenant Service which takes place every January.

What better ways than these could there be of beginning 2008 and dedicating the New Year to the glory of God? I wish you all a very happy New Year!

Rector's Notes

Week of Prayer for Christian Unity

As usual we will be marking the week with a daily series of services at various churches throughout the town. The theme for this year is 'Pray without ceasing'. Please support as many of the services as you can (see the calendar for details) but please note especially the President's Service which this year is of course being held at Holy Trinity on Sunday 20th January at 5 pm. The services of Unity Week are a wonderful opportunity to get to know our brothers and sisters in the other congregations in our town better.

Lent 2008

Lent begins remarkably early this year – Ash Wednesday is on the 6th February. You will see in the calendar details of the services on that day. Events for Lent will include:

- Our usual series of Wednesday services of Compline with Address in the Hospital Chapel (jointly with Llanrhos parish). This year the addresses will be on the theme of best loved hymns.
- There will be a series of Cytûn 'Prayer Workshops' designed to help us to grow in silent prayer. These will be held on Tuesday mornings beginning on 12th February.

 On Saturday 16th February we will be holding our Lenten Quiet Day at Loreto.

Full details of all these event will be in next month's magazine.

The Parish Share

Parishioners will be glad to know that we paid our 2007 Parish Share of £65,455 in full in early December. Despite this, the Diocesan authorities are very concerned that we did not pay any of this money until so late in the year. They have to send quarterly payments to Cardiff to fund the payment of Clergy stipends and so request that parishes pay their Share in instalments throughout the year – preferably in four equal payments. If this doesn't happen it puts a major strain on diocesan finances.

Eurig, our treasurer, has had very good reasons for not wishing to pay the whole parish Share until the end of the year. The way things work in this parish means that things are tight from the monetary point of view early in the year and it is much easier for us to pay in one go at the year's end. Eurig also reminds us that we have only been able to pay the Share in full by raiding our reserves. We can't continue to do this for much longer as they will be exhausted.

On the other hand we do need to see the picture from the Diocesan point of view and appreciate the situation they are in. Eventually there may simply not be enough money to pay the stipends of Church in Wales Clergy.

At the time of writing we do not know what our Share for 2008 will be – it will certainly be more than 2007's £65,000! What everyone has to accept is that we must somehow find ways of raising this money. If we can't then ultimately even a parish like Llandudno will not have a stipendiary priest or perhaps will have to share one with an-

other parish. Unthinkable! It may well happen.

So the challenge is: I) To try to pay at least some of our Share earlier in the year in 2008; 2) To continue to be able to pay our Share in full every year. Our plans for Pay and Display Car Parking at Holy Trinity will certainly help towards this in the long term (if they come to fruition). But we will still need to think of ways to increase the income of the parish through direct giving and money raising. Please pray about these matters and think about them in the weeks ahead.

A New Parish Logo

An internet picture search of 'Holy Trinity Logo' brings up numerous hits. By far the most common theme is the use of a 'triquetra'. The triquetra design predates Christianity but it was readily adopted by the early church. Not only does the design represent the three

entities in one but it also forms three overlapping ichthys (fish) symbols.

The superimposition of a circle on a triquetra is common feature. Indeed, Holy Trinity church has such a design on a banner in the north aisle of the nave. (left) The circle represents God, having neither beginning nor end.

Drawn as a Celtic knot, this design has been adopted as the parish logo. The triquetra represents the Holy Trinity. The circle, also a symbol for saintliness, represents St Tudno.

News from Uganda

6 November 2007

From Charles Owens

Many thanks for the kind gift from the team at Holy Trinity. Please accept my sincere thanks. This money is going directly into the completion of the girls' safe house at Karadali Primary School.

Many thanks for the invitation to come out and speak to your group in the New Year. In the meantime to bring you up to date, this is where we were following my return from Uganda two weeks ago.

The local Needs' Clinic which also serves our children is 50% complete and open to business with a medical officer, two nurses and a laboratory technician running it. The Karadali primary school now has eight completed classrooms and to date has 120 pupils ranging from PI - 7 year olds to P4 -II year olds. There are 45 residential children sleeping overnight using a temporary girls' dormitory in the library and a temporary boys' dormitory in the computer room as both these completed rooms are not needed at the moment. However the library will be needed in February when P5 and 6 will be brought on line - 12 & 14 year olds. This means we have to get the girls into the girls' permanent dormitory which we are calling the safe house. The school now has a full time staff of II (I enclose pictures of children and staff).

As soon as the three dormitory rooms are completed for February it is hoped that work can start on a similar building for the boys.

All in all I found everything carried out according to instructions and provided funds continue to come, praise the Lord, by the end of 2008 the school should be in full capacity.

There is a general peace in the Lira area at the moment as peace talks with the LRA continue. Please pray that the peace that is there now is sustained. The flooding that we have heard so much about is now receding and people are getting back to some form of normality. Unfortunately those in the East, most hit by the floods were also the ones that have quite recently left the displacement camps and gone back into the area they so hastily fled from

during the LRA activities. These people now have no food in or on the ground and no money to purchase food and are in dire need for financial help to purchase food to take them through the next six months. Planting cannot take place until the rains in April and then it will be August before they can benefit from the crops. Unfortunately most of the neighbours are in the same predicament so help must come from the outside. It is forecast that right across Central Africa and through East Africa, up to 2 million people will find themselves without and at the mercy of this famine caused by the recent disastrous flooding.

Please feel free to contact me should you require further information and once again many thanks for your concern and support for these our brothers and sisters in Uganda.
